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DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

ABOUT

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Parks & Community Services Department is to enhance the quality of life in Moreno Valley by providing safe and welcoming parks, trails, and open spaces, and by offering enriching recreational opportunities through quality facilities, programs, services, and activities for our residents.

WHAT IS THE PARKS & COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT?

The Parks & Community Services Department (PCSD) consists of four divisions that develop, build and maintain parks, trails, and recreational facilities in a safe and aesthetically pleasing manner; maintain recreational open space; provide a wide range of programs for the community including athletic leagues, recreation classes, after school programs, teen and senior activities; adaptive programs; library services and literacy programs; schedule use of facilities; plan, organize, and promote community events; enforce park rules and regulations and promote safe use of park facilities.

FUNDING SOURCE & BUDGETS

HOW IS THE PARKS & COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT FUNDED?

Funding for the department is comprised of revenue generated from various sources including property tax, special taxes, development impact fees, operating, usage and other miscellaneous fees from three Community Services Districts ("CSD" or "District") outlined below.

CSD-ZONE A (Budget \$12.9 million)

The citizens of Moreno Valley voted to create the Moreno Valley Community Services District ("CSD" or "District") at the time they approved the City's incorporation in 1984. The CSD "Zone A" was established to provide the community with parks, recreation, and community service programs. Services provided by PCSD include the operation and maintenance of parkland and linear parkway sites, improved multiuse trails, facilities, and recreational programs for the City's youth, adults, and senior citizens.

CFD NO.1 (Budget \$2.8 million)

Community Facilities District No. 1 ("CFD No. 1" or "District") was formed in 2003 to finance public services related to new parks constructed after the formation of the District and authorized the levy of a special tax onto the property tax roll of those parcels annexed into the District. Financial responsibility for maintenance of new parks is placed onto those properties that created the need for additional park facilities. Revenue received from this special tax can be used to fund park improvements and services within the district for the benefit of the residents of the District.

CFD 2021-01 (Budget \$525,500)

Community Facilities District No. 2021-01 (CFD No. 2021-01) was formed in 2021 to finance maintenance of park facilities constructed by both residential and non-residential development after the formation of the District authorized a special tax that is apportioned to properties annexed into the CFD.

FUTURE ANNEXATION:

As a requirement of development, future projects are approved on the condition the property owner provides a funding source to support the operations and ongoing maintenance of the facilities within the District. The qualified elector (i.e. landowner or registered voter, depending on the number of registered voters) can annex into the District and authorize the levy of the annual special tax on the property tax roll of the property or fund an endowment to cover the ongoing obligation for the project.


DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES:

The types of public services related to new parks to be financed from the levy of special taxes into the District, including the Future Annexation Area, include services for Park Maintenance such as planting, mowing, trimming, irrigation of grass, trees, shrubs, and other plants and vegetation. The operation, maintenance, repair, and replacement of irrigation systems, lighting systems, real property or improvements, that are owned and operated by the CSD are eligible expenditures. Expenditures for contracted costs for such services, salaries and benefits of staff, equipment, supplies, administrative and overhead costs, are allowable.

GRANT FUNDING (Budget \$13 million)

The department has been successful in securing grant funding from local, state and federal sources for various projects and programs. Over the past two years, \$3.3 million in grant funding was awarded for projects and programs across all divisions. This is in addition to the \$10.4 million in annual grant funding received. The goal is to continue to seek these opportunities to enhance programming and bring additional resources to the City.

PURPOSE

To coordinate administration and financial services for the department to streamline efforts, create efficiencies and provide the necessary support for all divisions in carrying out the goals of the department. Seek grant funding opportunities to enhance programming and bring additional resources to the City. In addition, support with the department's outreach and marketing efforts which aid in developing relationships among local businesses and the City while enhancing the resources for all programs.

FISCAL OVERSIGHT

- Manage, track, and reconcile department Operating Budget of \$31 million annually & Capital Improvement Budget of over \$20 million
- Prepare and compile department budget including allocations from DIF Park Improvement, Quimby, DIF Library, and other DIF's

GRANTS

BOARDS, COMMITTEES, AND COMISSIONS

Provide administrative support to the Parks, Community Services and Trails Commission, Library Commission, Arts Commission, the Senior Citizens' Advisory Board and the City/School Districts/State Joint Task Force.

KEEP MOVAL BEAUTIFUL-Beautify MoVal Parks, Trails & Roads

Coordinate the Beautify MoVal Program which allows community volunteers and businesses to beautify city parks, trails, and roads through annual cleanups, monetary/in- kind donations, and sponsorships. The program offers 36 park sites, 40 trails and 105 road segment opportunities for clean-ups and enhancements. The program generates approximately \$15,000 in annual sponsorships & donations. The Community Day of Service Cleanup events are held three times a year and hosts about 300 volunteers annually.

OUTREACH & MARKETING

Facilitate requests for marketing materials, social media posts, website updates, & webpage creation across all divisions. Serve as the liaison for the department and the City's Media team. Coordinate outreach events, including creation of community surveys to gather resident input, attend community meetings with community based organizations, school districts and other stakeholders. Seek sponsorships and donations from local businesses for special events and programs.

LIBRARY OPERATIONS & ADMINISTRATION

To serve the residents of Moreno Valley as a progressive and responsive public library resource; providing users of all ages with their material needs in a variety of electronic and traditional formats; serving as an information center providing materials related to the issues and interests of day-to-day living; providing educational and informational support to students; and providing information on cultural and technical literacy in a welcoming public setting.

The City has a multi-year professional services agreement with Library Systems & Services, LLC to provide library operations and administration for the Main Library, Mall Branch, and Iris Plaza Branch. Annually, the Library circulates around 250,000 items and hosts more than 270,000 visitors. The Library also provides a variety of adult and youth literacy programs funded by grants from the California State Library.

PURPOSE

To enhance the quality of life for individuals and families by offering inclusive, innovative, and enriching recreational, educational, and social programs. The Community Services Division promotes safety, well-being, and personal growth through diverse activities such as childcare, senior services, seasonal camps, teen programming, and adaptive programs. Striving to foster a vibrant and connected community.

RECREATION

Oversee a wide range of recreational programs and activities for all ages, including contract classes, the 'Movin' thru MoVal' mobile recreation program, and 'Time for Tots.' Organize specialty and summer camps for teens and youth, assist with the production of the 'Soaring Activity Guide' (distributed 180,000 times annually), and manage the Teen S.P.O.T., which provides teens with digital access, growth opportunities, events, and trips. Additionally, the Community Demonstration Garden is available for residents to stop by and learn more about gardening, composting and other great tips on starting and maintaining their own home gardens.

EMERGING LEADERS COUNCIL (ELC)

This program helps youth learn about city government, community engagement, health and wellness, and job training. The Emerging Leaders Council meets monthly at the Conference & Recreation Center.

SENIOR CENTER

Coordinate a variety of programs, classes, activities, and events for individuals aged 50 and older at the Senior Community Center. Offerings include free classes, low-cost nutrition programs, resources and services, excursions, and special events. The Senior Center serves approximately 50,000 seniors annually and manages facility rentals.

SENIOR CITIZENS' ADVISORY BOARD (SCAB)

The Senior Citizens' Advisory Board considers matters pertaining to the senior citizens, senior citizens programs, including policies for the Moreno Valley Senior Community Center. The Senior Citizens' Advisory Board meets monthly at the Moreno Valley Senior Community Center.

A CHILD'S PLACE

Licensed after school childcare program funded by California Department of Social Services General Childcare Program. The program serves school-aged children at four elementary school sites. The program provides academic support through homework assistance and tutoring, along with enrichment activities such as STEM projects, arts and crafts, music, dance, and recreational support. Each child receives daily nutritional snacks and meals funded by the Child & Adult Care Food Program Grant. The program operates 248 days from school release time to 6:00 pm and during non-school days from 7:00 am to 6:00 pm.

PURPOSE

To manage, maintain, rehabilitate and improve the existing parks, trails, and recreational facilities; plan, develop and construct new parks, trails and recreational facilities; and promote public safety in parks and on trails.

PARKS & LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE

Administer maintenance operations of parks and facilities for 43 sites (626.02 acres), 32.93 acres of landscaping along 3.61 miles of the Juan Bautista de Anza Bike Trail, and 11.68 miles of multi-use trails. Administer landscape maintenance of approximately 224 acres of parkways, medians, open space, flood channels and water quality basins.

CONTRACT MAINTENANCE

Administer landscape maintenance of the Senior Community Center, Conference and Recreation Center, Main Library, City Hall, Public Safety Building, City Annex, Animal Shelter, Fire Stations, Utility Substations, Utility Field Office, Edison Easement, parkways, medians, open space, flood channels, water quality basins City-wide, linear parks and the Juan Bautista de Anza bike trail.

COTTONWOOD GOLF CENTER

Administer the Cottonwood Golf Center maintenance program for 16-acre golf course.

COMMUNITY SPECIAL DISTRICTS (CSD) PUBLIC FACILITIES

Assists Facilities Maintenance Division to administer the maintenance program for the CSD city-owned buildings, such as the Senior Community Center, March Field Park Community Center, March Field Park Annex Building, Conference and Recreation Center, Cottonwood Golf Center, Child Care Grant Classrooms, and TownGate Community Center.

PARKS PROJECTS

Oversee park/park facility construction and facility improvement projects. Administer CIP Projects included in the Capital Improvement Plan, which includes parks, buildings, and green belts; macro cellular towers and operation licenses on all City property; Develop projects requiring a city park, multi -use trail, or bikeway; provides design assistance, plan check, and inspection for City and Developer park projects.

PURPOSE

To provide a variety of special events that help promote a celebration of community, culture, and diversity for individuals, families, community groups, and businesses; provide youth and adult recreational sports programming ranging from field allocations, leagues, camps/clinics and open play; and provide park facility space along with exceptional customer service to residents, schools, and organizations who need facilities to reserve.

SPECIAL EVENTS

Coordinate citywide events and programs such as the 4th of July Independence Day Parade and Funfest, MoVal Movies and MoVal Rocks, Day of the Dead, Snow Day, Tree Lighting, Springtastic, El Grito Mexican Independence Day, Juneteenth, Public Safety Expo, Adult Flashlight Egg Scramble, Multicultural and Art Festival, and Fun Color Run. This team is the lead in recruiting and securing sponsors and partners for special events, programs, and activities.

FACILITY RENTALS

Facilitate rental of department's facilities at Cottonwood Golf Center, TownGate Community Center, Civic Center Amphitheater, and Conference and Recreation Center. In June 2021, the City opened the new Civic Center Amphitheater, which is the new home for special events and performing arts in Moreno Valley.


SPORTS

Administer pee wee, youth and adult sports programs serving more than 6,000 residents. Coordinate sports facility reservations for more than 80 park and school athletic sites. Oversee Cottonwood Golf Center operations including the pro shop and more than 11,000 rounds of golf annually. Oversee operation of the skate parks and soccer arenas.

PUBLIC ART PROGRAMS

The Public Art program supports community identity by encouraging the development and displays of public art to promote the history, heritage, culture, and contemporary identity of Moreno Valley. There are three program opportunities: City Art Projects, Artist Request for Funding, and Art Loan Program. The City Art Projects Program is a call to artist to provide a service to the City when a project is needed. The Artist Request for Funding Program is an opportunity for artist to request funding to provide original works located in a public space or facility and accessible to the public. The Art Loan Program is an opportunity to display works of art in a City facility to enhance the aesthetics of the facility.


